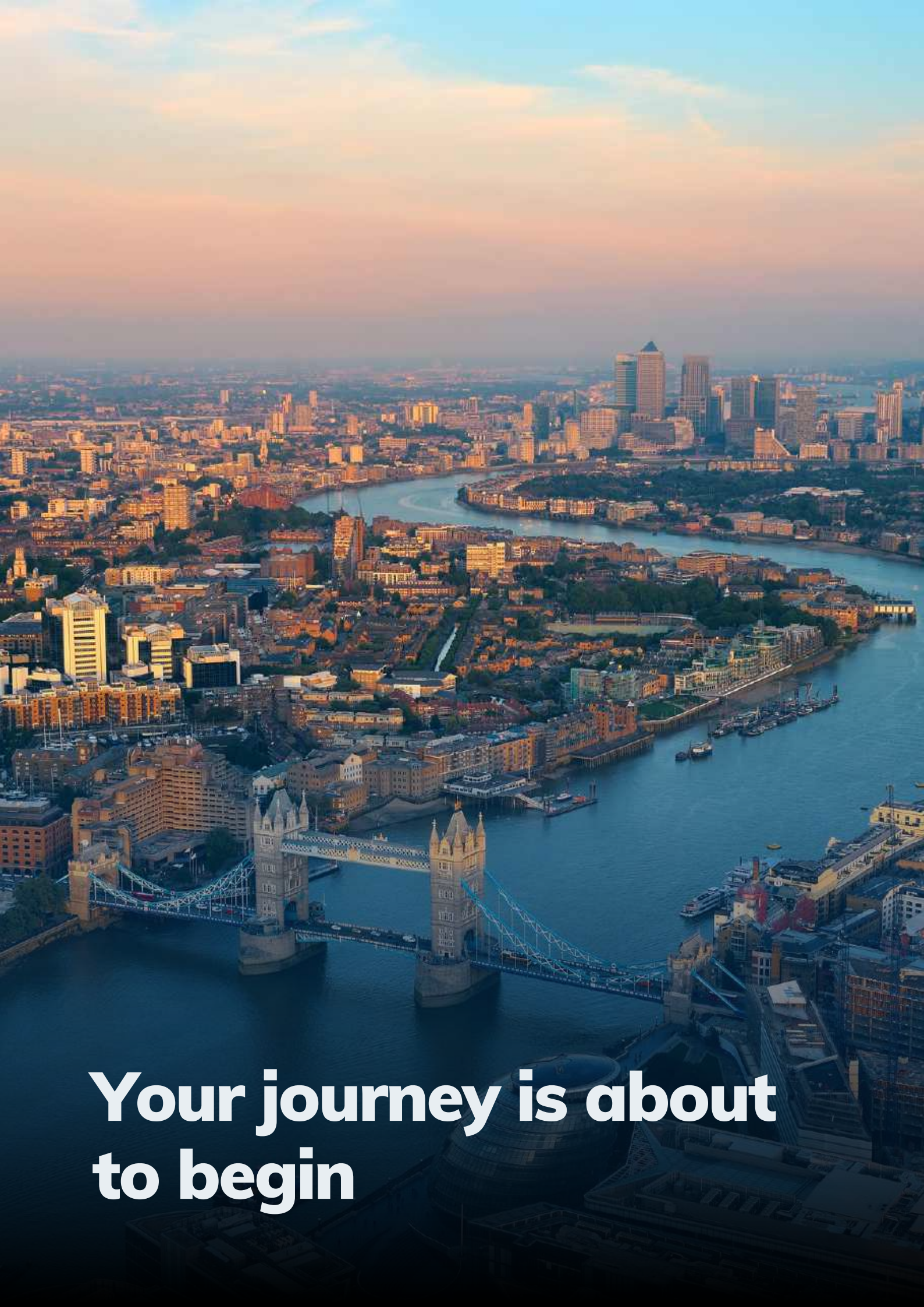

Preparing to travel to the UK

Visa & Visa Compliance

Applicants from outside the UK are reminded that they must comply with their Visa conditions, particularly in respect of attendance, notification of change of contact details / personal circumstances and satisfactory progress at IFG during their period of study.

Students must give good reasons along with supporting evidence for absence and will be accepted only if IFG finds it genuine and acceptable.

It is the student's responsibility to ensure that they notify IFG immediately if there is a change in their contact details, such as landline / mobile phone numbers, or any other change in personal circumstances.

Students must provide the details of their next of kin at the time of application and notify IFG immediately should there be any change pertaining to their next of kin (this will usually be a parent or other relative).

Applying for your Visa

To check whether you need a visa to come and study with us at IFG London visit the website www.gov.uk/check-uk-visa

If you do need a visa you will need a passport with at least 6 months unexpired, a letter of acceptance from IFG, evidence of having sufficient funds to finance your tuition fees, accommodation and other living costs as well as your return flight.

Students who don't require a visa

Some nationalities do not require a visa to study on IFG courses.

These include Saudi Arabia, the UAE, Qatar, Malaysia, Brazil, EU & EEA member countries, the USA, and some Caribbean countries.

For students with these nationalities, you will instead require an ETA (Electronic Travel Authorisation).

This is a quick and easy process and should only take a few days. You can find more information on ETA's and on how to apply from this link: gov.uk/eta



Insurance and healthcare

Travel Insurance

Before you travel, you are advised to insure your luggage and label it clearly with IFG's name, or the name of your accommodation in the UK. Insurance, however, is not compulsory.

Dental Care

For dental care, you should also register with a dentist. Dental treatment is not free in the UK, even with National Health Service dentists.

Medical Insurance & Healthcare

Free medical treatment, from the National Health Service (NHS) is available for accidents & emergencies. However for other medical treatments you will need to pay. We also advise that if you have any pre-existing medical conditions or are taking any medication that you discuss with your doctor before you leave and also ask that you inform IFG before you arrive.

You are therefore strongly advised to take out medical insurance to cover the duration of your stay in the UK.

What to bring with you (and not to bring!)



Baggage allowance

Be sure not to exceed your baggage allowance and try not bring a lot of luggage with you, as you will have to carry it at some point! It is often cheaper to buy things locally, if you take into account extra baggage and freight costs

Clothes & personal items

You will need warm clothing when you arrive, particularly if you are coming from a hot climate. There is no dress code at IFG - most students dress informally, for example in jeans, trousers, or a skirt with a jumper or t-shirt. Bring your normal range of clothes and buy additional items when you are here. There are many cheap shops in the local area, for example Primark, TK Maxx and H&M. Bring clothes for a special occasion, for example a suit, dress or national costume. Religious dress can be worn at any time and discrimination on religious grounds is illegal in the UK. You may bring your laptop - it is advisable to get this insured before you travel.



Do not bring

Do not bring valuables, plants/seeds, and dairy or meat products. There are strict controls on importing foodstuffs and plants, including heavy fines and imprisonment. Your food stuffs can be purchased in the local area around IFG, which has excellent international food shops and markets

Cooking equipment and bedding

We do not advise that you bring cooking equipment or bedding to the UK as these are bulky items to carry and can be purchased locally quite cheaply. For advice on where to buy these goods, please speak to us on arrival.

Documents to bring with you

You must bring the following documents when you register with IFG:

- Passport
- Four Passport size photos
- Original copies of your academic transcripts
- Original copies of English qualifications (usually IELTS certificate)
- Proof of address in the UK
- IFG Letter of Acceptance

Documents which we can provide you with after registration:

- Letter to help you open a bank account
- Letter to help you register with a doctor
- IFG Student ID card
- Application information for a student travel card (Student Oyster Card)
- Letter so you do not have to pay Council Tax (a tax based on where you live)



Money Matters

We can help you to open a bank account on arrival at IFG. To open a bank account in the UK you will need the following documents:

- IFG Enrolment Letter
- Passport
- Confirmation of UK & Overseas Address

A quick and simple option is to open an online bank account which allows you to receive and make transfer and take cash from ATM machines.

Whilst there is no limit on funds brought into the UK, you may need to meet exchange control requirements in your country.

You should avoid bringing large amounts of cash into the country as this poses a security risk. Instead, we suggest bringing a bank draft, opening an online bank account or using a pre-paid cash card such as [Revolut](#).

It is also advisable not to keep your cash and personal documents all in the same place on your person (e.g. passport, acceptance letter, bank draft, pre-paid cash card, personal contact details).

We also recommend that you take two sets of photocopies of your personal documents prior to travelling, taking one copy in your check-in luggage and leaving one with your family.

You will need to bring some sterling cash with you for your first few days in the country (approximately £200), and money in the form a bank draft or pre-paid cash card (approximately £300) for immediate expenses.

If you are renting accomodation you may need more immediate money for deposits and advance rents.

Living expenses per academic year

On top of your course fees, you will need approximately £1,500 per month for living expenses. The cost of living expenses is dependent on so many factors but as a rough guide we have calculated what it could cost you for the major items you will need when you are in the UK.

Accommodation

May cost you £250-£350 per week. Please refer to our website for more information on accommodation.

Bills

If you live in a house or apartment, you will need to calculate water, heating and electricity into your budget. This can be anything from £60/month for all bills depending on the time of year. If you live in student accommodation, then you will pay no extra for these things.

Food

If you buy your own food, try and budget in about £60-£70 per week to purchase food supplies. You can of course be smart about this and save more.

Travel

Student travel in London is 30% cheaper for students with a Student Oyster card and we can help you apply for one. This will mean that your weekly travel costs within London will be about £25 per week.

Study materials

IFG gives you access to all the main textbooks for your modules, but it is good to have your own copy of some of them. You ought to budget about £200 for these.

Telephone

The cost of mobiles varies depending on the provider and tariff you are on. Prepaid is generally cheaper to control costs, but if you make a lot of calls a contract may start at £25 a month. International calls are expensive, so try to keep with Skype, WhatsApp, Viber or WeChat when you phone home.

Internet

Internet access is usually included in accommodation fees, but if you do need to buy this separately, most companies charge a base of £20-£25 a month for standard internet in the UK.

Leisure

Believe it or not, some things like museums and art galleries in London are free! A cinema ticket in the UK costs around £12. The cost of eating will vary enormously. McDonald's will cost approx. £7 but, for health reasons, we don't advise you eat there every day!

Part-time work

When you get to university, you will be able to work up to 20 hours a week and will probably earn about £9 per hour. However, your Visa conditions do not allow you to work while you are studying pre-University.

Budgeting

Be sure to budget sensibly whilst you are studying in the UK. If you do experience financial difficulties while you are with us, do come and talk to us.



Checklist before travelling

Have I obtained all the entry clearance/visa information I need?

Have I booked my accommodation?

If I have booked accommodation through IFG, do I have the letter confirming the address?

Have I received my letter of acceptance?

Have I contacted the Head of Admissions regarding my disability (where applicable)?

Have I bought my ticket and travel insurance?

Have I checked my government's restrictions on taking money out of the country?

Have I checked luggage restrictions and allowances?

Have I obtained cash in UK sterling and organised a pre-paid cash card for the first few weeks of my stay?

Have I spoken to my doctor about any prescription medication I may need to bring with me?

Have I arranged airport transfer with IFG or with a contact in the UK?

(Note: if you are under 18 we will need confirmation of your transfer if you have not arranged with us)



Arriving in the UK

When should I arrive?

We will give you more details on registration and induction times separately, but, ideally, you should aim to arrive a few days before registration begins in order to settle into your accommodation and get some rest before the term starts. Please contact IFG with details of your travel plans as soon as you have confirmed them.

Accommodation

We strongly advise all students to arrange their accommodation before they travel. We can help you with this if you get in touch as we have excellent links with student accommodation providers. Further information can be found [on our website](#).



Arrivals

Immigration control

When you enter the terminal and approach passport control, you will see electronic screens indicating where you should queue.

There will be two queues: one for travellers with British or EU passports, and other nationalities who can use the E-Gates. The other queues are for all other passport holders. Make sure you join the correct queue or you could waste a lot of time.

When you reach the front of the queue, the Immigration Officer at the desk will want to see that your documents are in order, so make sure you have the following documents ready:

- Your passport/travelling documents
- Your IFG Acceptance letter
- Evidence of your funding, such as sponsor's letter or bank statements.

You should also be prepared to answer some questions about yourself, including where you will be staying and what you intend to do during your time in the UK.

You may be asked to undergo a brief, routine health check by the airport doctor, which might include an X-ray. The health check will take place in a separate room.

Afterward you will need to return to immigration control.

As long as your documents are in order, you should pass through immigration smoothly.

However, if you find that you need help for whatever reason, you can ask the immigration officer to telephone us.

Customs Control

Once you have collected luggage, you will have to pass through Customs Control, which is divided into two different channels

GREEN CHANNEL: This is for travellers outside the UK with nothing to declare. Customs Officials may still stop and ask you to open your luggage for inspection.

RED CHANNEL: This is for travellers with goods to declare

If you are carrying more duty-free or tax-free good than you are allowed to bring, you will be asked to pay duty on them before you can proceed.

So if you choose to bring more good than your duty-free allowance, do make sure you have a credit card or enough extra cash to pay the duty.

Make sure know what the prohibited good are and that you are not bringing anything prohibited with you.



Be aware of the rules

There are strict rules regarding the importation of food and plant products into the UK. For example, importing meat and dairy products is prohibited.

Collections from the airport

If you contact us before you travel, we can arrange for a driver to meet you and take you to your accommodation - the driver will be at the arrivals gate with your name on a board.

Students wishing to be collected from the airport must inform IFG of the following at least one week before the arrival date:

- Airline and the Flight Number
- Arrival Airport and Date of Arrival.

Please remember that if you are under 18 we will need confirmation of your transfer if you have not arranged with us.

You can also travel by bus or train to your accommodation address. If you contact us in advance then we can give you details of the best route.





Welcome to the UK

Coming to the UK to study will be an exciting time for you to meet new people and find out about a new culture.

For students unused to the Western way of life, however, you may find the culture and some of the traditions very strange! This section aims to to familiarise you with some UK customs and give you some basic insight into the UK way of life.

Politeness

Politeness is ingrained into the British way of life thus 'please', 'thank you' and 'sorry' are some of the most commonly used words in the UK. It is advisable to use these, especially when in the company of strangers. British people are relaxed, but also quite reserved especially with people they do not know. If strangers do not greet you on the street, for example, it is not personal - merely an expression of this reserved culture.

Etiquette and Respect

It is important to be on time in Britain and being late is generally considered to be rude. If you are going to be late you should inform the person you have arranged to meet beforehand. Equal rights for all people - whatever race, gender, class, religion, disability or sexual orientation - is extremely important in the UK. It is illegal to discriminate against anyone on these bases. In accordance with this law, you are free to wear religious dress at any time. Tipping is not obligatory and should be given for good service only. You may wish to tip a taxi driver or waiter in a restaurant. If you are invited to someone's house for a meal it is polite to bring them a small gift (bottle of wine, flowers, chocolates or a souvenir from your country) to say thank you.

Safety & Emergency

If an emergency occurs, dial 999 on the nearest phone. This is a free number, which will put you in contact with the emergency medical, police, fire or coastguard services. Please note that police officers are friendly and approachable, and will be happy to help you. They are not connected to the military and are not usually armed.

Climate & Clothing

The UK has a temperate climate, with warm damp summers and cool wet winters. Generally, the weather is unpredictable and can vary even within one day. The average temperature during winter is approximately 4°C, and during the summer months 18°C. There are four seasons in the year, which we will explore in the following pages.

Dress Code

There is no dress code at IFG and student clothing is generally informal. You are free to wear religious dress. For special occasions you might want to wear your national costume. It is advisable to carry extra layers with you - a warm jumper, a waterproof coat or jacket, and an umbrella, as the weather often changes throughout the course of a day.

Religion

The UK is a multicultural society and discrimination on the basis of religion is illegal. We encourage students to practise their own faith and have respect for others. The area where IFG is located is a particularly multi-cultural area, and there are plenty of places to worship, whatever your faith. There is also a room at the college for prayer or meditation.

Diet

The British diet may seem heavy and unfamiliar to some students. It tends to include meat, one or two vegetables, and potatoes. However, there is plenty of variety in the UK, including food from many different countries. You can eat this food in restaurants or buy it from international supermarkets and markets. It is important that you eat a good diet as a student and do not rely too heavily on fast food.



Seasons



Autumn - September to November

In autumn the weather can be both cold and warm. Temperatures vary between 7-18°C, but are likely to get colder towards November. You will need a warm jacket and an umbrella.



Winter - December to Early March

Winter brings Britain's shortest and coldest days (about 7-8 hours of daylight) but these can be beautifully crisp and bright. Temperatures vary between 0-5°C. Occasionally it snows.



Spring - March to May

In Spring, the weather can be warm and mild or cold and wet! Temperatures vary between 6-11°C. It gets warmer towards May.



Summer - June to August

Most days are warm, and sometimes hot, but evenings can be cool. Temperatures average 15-25°C, but can reach 28-38°C. During winter, the longest night of the year is 22nd December when it is dark for about 15 hours. During summer, the shortest night of the year is 21st June when it is dark for little more than 5 hours.

Pre-Masters in Law

Pre-Sessional for Postgraduate Studies

This short three month Pre-Sessional for Postgraduate Studies programme is designed for students who have completed their first degrees but who want to prepare for study at masters level by improving their Academic English and Study Skills. The course helps students to develop their language skills and achieve the standard required to meet university language entry requirements. Our Pre-Sessional Programme also helps students to prepare for the style of teaching and learning required at postgraduate level, developing research skills, understanding how to avoid plagiarism, and how to make effective academic presentations.

Course content

The main focus of the course is to develop the Academic English skills required to meet university entry requirements. These include:

- Improving grammatical skills
- Increasing range of general and specialised vocabulary
- Enhancing sentence and paragraph structure
- Improving reading skills and identifying key information and arguments
- Interpreting tables and graphs
- Tackling multiple choice questions
- Speaking in a lucid and fluent manner

Other topics include

- Structuring academic reports
- Writing well-structured essays
- Quantitative and qualitative research skills
- Avoiding plagiarism
- IT related communication
- Constructing and delivering academic presentations
- Interview and negotiation skills

Pre-PHD Programme

This course will equip you with the academic and research skills which are required to successfully gain a place at a UK university and to embark on your research studies with confidence. The course consists of a series of workshops together with one-to-one sessions. Our tutors have many years of experience in helping students at this level of study and understand exactly what is required for a successful application. Comprehensive online study materials accompany the workshops, helping you to work effectively between workshop sessions in developing your own proposal.

Programme Objectives

By the end of the course, students will:

- Have developed their understanding of different aspects of research methods
- Have developed a range of skills to successfully apply for PhD study at universities in different countries
- Have completed an appropriate and viable research proposal
- Be able to defend the proposal at an interview

There are no formal assessments for this course.

English Language Programmes

IFG offers a range of general and more specialist English language courses which can be taken separately or as part of a combined programme. These courses are also available to study online.

Whether you want to improve your IELTS grade or improve your communication skills for business purposes, our qualified and experienced teachers will help you to make the most of your time with us. Teaching takes place in small groups which means that tutors can focus more easily on the specific needs of individual students.

It is also possible to combine group lessons with one-to-one sessions.

After an initial assessment, you will discuss your own individual study plan with one of our tutors and, as your course continues, regular assessments will show the progress you are making and highlight any weaknesses which need to be worked on.



IFG Policies

Attendance

We strongly advise students to attend all their teaching sessions. There is a very clear link between high attendance and high marks and therefore we insist that students attend well. We appreciate however that sometimes it is not possible to attend lessons. This might be due to illness or other unforeseen and unavoidable reasons. So long as you contact us before the lesson to let us know you are not going to be able to attend, then we may give you an authorised absence. Students should understand that records of attendance will be kept and the final attendance percentage will be included in your final transcripts. Punctuality

Being late for classes is not only detrimental to the academic progress of the latecomer, but is disruptive for the entire class.
